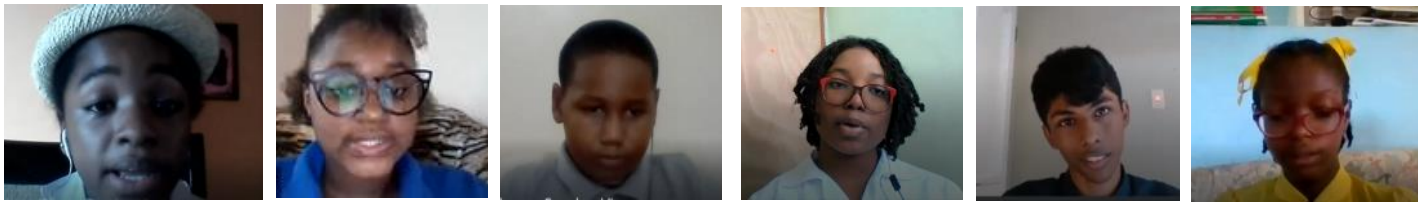
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The 16th Annual Caribbean Child Research Conference



The 16th Annual Caribbean Child Research Conference was held virtually on November 24–25, 2021 under the theme “*Almost Two Years! COVID-19, Children’s Rights and Sustainable Development Goals: Challenges and Opportunities.*” It was hosted by the Sir Arthur Lewis Institute of Social and Economic Studies (SALISES), in partnership with the United Nations Children’s Fund (UNICEF), Eastern Caribbean. A total of 243 entries were received from young people in 15 countries in the Caribbean region to several competitions aimed at increasing awareness of children’s rights: outstanding researcher (12–17 years), essay (8–11 years) and poetry (8–11 years).

This year’s conference began with remarks from representatives from SALISES, the Organisation of Eastern Caribbean States and UNICEF, Eastern Caribbean, Jamaica’s State Minister of Education, Youth and Information, as well as young winners from last year’s conference.

The first day of the conference focused on adult researchers who presented in various concurrent sessions: Child Education in the Caribbean; Child Participation in the Caribbean; Navigating Education Practices and Experiences of School Children due to the COVID-19 Pandemic; Contesting Child Well-being in the Education System in Trinidad and Tobago: Before, During and Post Pandemic; Parenting Issues Before, During and Post COVID-19; and Children in Violent Circumstances in the Caribbean.

As in previous years, the second day was dedicated to children. The children’s presentations demonstrated their research skills, oratory skills, confidence, creativity,

composure, maturity, passion and eloquence. Some included real-life videos to make the issues come alive, making it personal and relatable. Many shared their experiences of sadness, anger, fear and loneliness. Essay competition winner Kayla Higgins from Barbados maintained that many fundamental rights were under threat: “The basic children’s right to receive an education has been violated. Some children have access to everything they need, while others some, and others nothing.” In her winning poem, Lynn Exumé from St. Vincent and the Grenadines raised the issues of job loss and death: “Parents still losing jobs, no food, no money! Child abuse of every type, still rampant, in every country! Loss of loved ones, even in my family, it’s a real tragedy.”

The conference was highly successful with close to 400 participants online on both days and with live-streaming of selected sessions on both days by UWITV. The conference allowed our children to be involved in meaningful ways as we listened to them making recommendations for the improvement in the quality of their lives. It promoted children’s rights through research and contributed to children’s well-being.

According to Professor Aldrie Henry-Lee, University Director, SALISES, The UWI, “the most rewarding part of the conference is listening to our children as they make recommendations for the improvement in the quality of their lives. Believe me, they are more eloquent than some of us adults!”

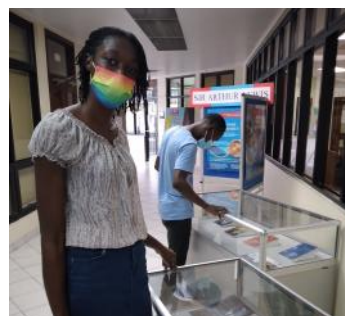

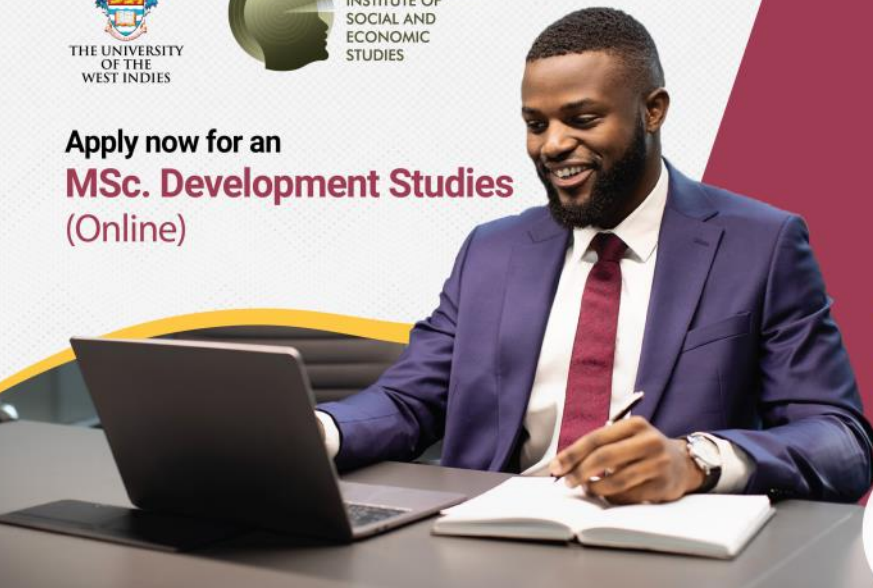

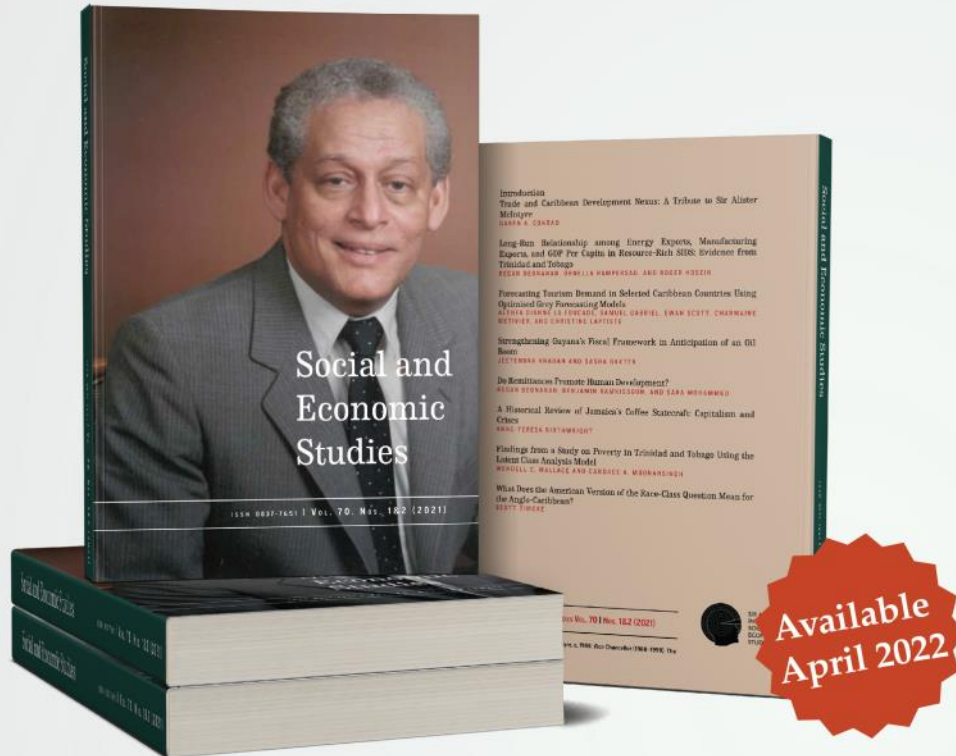

Norman Girvan Documentation Centre – Citation Generators

A citation generator is a free online service that helps users to create bibliographic citations automatically. Library catalogues and databases offer an one-click function to create an auto citation to the item being searched. The websites provide various online forms where users can fill in bibliographic information taken from the item at their hands. As for bibliographic management systems, users have to upload bibliographic records into the system, which can help create either a single citation or entire bibliographies for their project. Citation generators bring **convenience** to users at the cost of **quality**. Whichever citation generator one chooses,

remember: **none of them are foolproof!**

Therefore, it is strongly recommended that citations generated by these tools be checked against online APA, MLA or Chicago style guides, or printed handbooks/manuals kept at the Circulation Desk at the Norman Girvan Documentation Centre, or talk to a librarian for help.

Student Highlight – Keenan Falconer



Keenan Falconer, recipient of the Prime Minister's National Youth Award for Excellence 2021 (Academics), was a student at the Sir Arthur Lewis Institute of Social and Economic Studies (SALISES), Mona, where he completed a Master of Science (MSc.) in Development Studies, with a concentration in Economic Development Policy. Keenan is an economist and development specialist with over five years' experience at various government

institutions and multilateral development agencies where he has spearheaded significant national development projects and initiatives. He is presently the Special Project Officer at the Bank of Jamaica.

What were your reasons for selecting SALISES and the MSc. programme?

The MSc. in Development Studies and by extension the wider SALISES community appealed to me because of the wide range of course options, which I found fascinating because of their multidisciplinary nature. From what I knew of SALISES beforehand, and its previous iterations, the Institute perfectly aligned with my own ideological and philosophical orientation geared towards certain values associated with Third World devel-

opment, social justice and regional integration. Moreover, several renowned scholars from the Caribbean of international repute, whose work I had been familiar with, further burnished the reputation of SALISES and confirmed in my mind that this was truly the place to be in order to advance not only my professional career or academic credentials, but also my personal development. Coupled with the fact that my background was in economics, this made a specialisation in economic development policy a natural choice.

How was your experience at SALISES?

What are your future endeavours?

My ultimate career goal, which I hope to accomplish within the next decade, is to work at a senior level of a large, multilateral development institution, such as the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), the World Bank, the Caribbean Development Bank (CDB) or the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB). I believe that my degree from SALISES makes me well-positioned to contribute to effective policy formulation and implementation for Jamaica and the Caribbean through any or possibly even all of the aforementioned avenues.

Citation – Annie Paul



The legend that is Annie Paul was born in Kerala, India, a place made famous by the book *The God of Small Things*, winner of the Booker Prize in 1997. Destiny brought Annie here to us in Jamaica, and she decided to make it her home for the last

thirty-plus years. She holds a BA in Literature, a BSc in Journalism and a MA in Sociology. Annie is a writer, critic, editor, blogger and tweeter. She has thirty years of experience in the field of publishing, which includes designing high-quality publications, while her online writing has been referenced in various international media. Her most recent major publication was in 2020 and provides an engaging and lively biography of a globally renowned Caribbean intellectual, Stuart Hall.

Her career at The UWI began in 1989 as co-ordinator of the UWI Publishers Association (UWIPA), where she undertook the production of the sales catalogue listing publications for all three Institutes of Social and Economic Research (ISERs) and all publishing units on campus. During the period 1990–92, Annie was the Assistant Editor at ISER and produced the ISER Working Paper Series, books and monographs. It was during this time when she designed and produced the *Caribbean Review of Books*, a UWIPA publication designed to advertise and promote UWI publications. From August 1992 to September 2021, Annie held the position of Publications Officer and Head of the Publications Section at ISER/SALISES.

As managing editor of the journal, *Social and Economic Studies*, she consistently worked to improve its accessibility, viability and visibility. Some of her key achievements with SES include: the redesign of the cover, SES's inclusion in ProQuest and EBSCO databases, the production of several special issues from papers delivered at SALISES conferences, and negotiation of an agreement with JSTOR for the online access to the entire back run of the SES from 1953. In recent years, Annie worked assiduously to overhaul and reposition the SES for the 21st century.

As a writer, she has not only published in numerous journals and magazines but continues to maintain her blog, *Active Voice*, and her Twitter feed, which have both been quoted in various international media. She has also worked collaboratively with others to actualize publishing and writing projects of high quality, such as being a founding editor of *Small Axe*, a journal and platform for Caribbean criticism, published by Duke University.

In 2018, Annie established an online magazine called *PREE* for new contemporary writing from and about the Caribbean. It publishes original works of fiction, non-fiction, poetry, essays, and interviews. Annie will surely be busy during her retirement as she continues to maintain her presence in the online environment.

Her colleagues and co-workers all agree that she displays a no-nonsense, no-foolishness attitude when it comes to her work. She always displays a strong sense of justice and humour which is also evident in her writings. Staff past and present describe her as direct and fair, with a sharp eye for detail. They know that when she is in office and focused on her reading and writing, there must be no interruptions.

On the occasion of your retirement, Annie, we all want to thank you for your many years of great leadership as you consistently employed your various skills to work for the betterment of the Institute, University and the region. 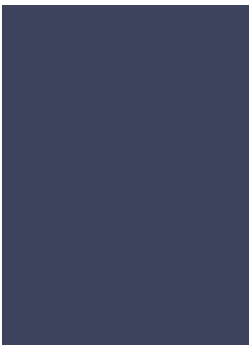


Christmas “Xmask” Function
